Dear Members and Friends of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church,

This summer has been a time of harvest for us at St. John's. The storm that preceded my arrival, and the cleanup of the results of that storm, saw positive transition and the fruit of our time together.

The preschool rooms that had been prepared and furnished are no longer vacant but filled-to-capacity. Why? Because we had a vision for a future at St. John's filled with hope — and lots of little kids learning. Ongoing Tender Loving Care for our facility in long over-do repointing of the brickwork on our 'preschool' portion of the building, replacement of 40 plus windows, and numerous smaller projects have kept us busy.

Thirty-six (36) members participated in short term (5 weeks) Summer Learning Opportunities (5 different topics in small group format) and have expressed appreciation for the spiritual growth and expansion of their knowledge of scripture. They had homework and they didn't complain. They embraced the opportunity to be a Learning Community. They celebrated getting to know other 'friends' who attend St. John's and did so by focusing on Jesus – not each other.

Lessons learned in these studies were invaluable when things didn't quite work out the way we planned for continuation of Operation 143 through the summer. We prayed and listened as God showed us His plan. Being available to God's intention allowed the blessing of your generous food donations to be provided to children attending Camp Noah.

Graduates of the music department at Kutztown University offered youthful energy to our invitation to explore possibilities and expand their resumes by providing music from many different genres throughout the summer. We intentionally designed this summer to be broader in scope as a way to shake off the stress and heaviness of 18 months of pandemic cloud cover. Like Mason, they too found an openness (mostly – a few members complained, and a few said we will return


when you have better music) to a judgment-free environment, acceptance for where they are at the beginning of their careers in music and the gift they have to offer being met by our gift of inviting them to join with us in ministry.

Come to the Table served on average 100 meals each Saturday night and is expanding the depth of this ministry by its ultimate reason for existence – getting to know our neighbors. Feeding them is great. Getting to know them is God's command. We strengthened our ministry by developing a belief for many that we all have a responsibility in providing care for each other at St. John's. This DNA shift is the most difficult and the most Christ-honoring of all witnesses in congregational ministry. In this way, all understand ourselves to be the priesthood of all believers. When we fall short and believe staff are more important than the owner for caring ministries, we inhibit and deny the work of the Holy Spirit in us and quite simply prevent all from experiencing the joy that comes from standing shoulder to shoulder as siblings in Christ.

A preschool staff overnight, a youth overnight and many workshops filled our summer schedule. We didn't shut down as is often the case in congregational ministry, we expanded and worked even more to plan and execute a plan that builds the body to maturity. We can talk all we want about doing and being, however, unless we take the step of action it will fall short and frustrate and demoralize those with a Christ-honoring vision to be a learning community that brings all the glory to God.

A MISSION TO WELCOME ALL

The journey began early this year on Zoom (didn't everything?). In May we attended a workshop on how to build an inclusive church, sponsored by the ELCA (on Zoom, again!). This program is called "Reconciling in Christ", or RIC. It is for congregations and other Lutheran faith communities to publicly welcome all people: people of race, people of sexual orientations, people of gender identities, people of gender expressions. We learned that there is actually a process to follow – and, unbeknownst to us, we had already begun!

To continue the first part of the process of building a foundation, we invited Jaime Fivecoat, volunteer advocate, to spend a Saturday in July helping our small group get organized (in person, not Zoom!). During our morning together we explored how each of us has faced discrimination or stigma. It is more common than any of us realized. We transitioned to identifying folks who would give us a broad range of opinions as our data. In order to gather this data the Welcoming All group will need to interview these people. We will be asking each person the same questions. The interviewer may ask to take notes during the interview. These notes will become our data. This data will be used to guide the next steps of our journey.

The tabulation of the data will conclude the second step of the process. The third step is to continue to build relationships among our congregation members. Our journey, now begun, will be defined by your honesty and your faith as our guideposts. May we all find blessings on this journey.

COUNCIL CONNECTION

I led one of our 5 summer learning opportunities, *Fail: What to do when things go wrong*. This study is focused on Jeremiah's story as an example to help us to have more courage to take risks and deal with disappointment and failure in our lives...not on our own, but by turning to God. Pastor Bob asked me to spend a little bit of time on our youth retreat in August teaching the students about failing. While the book I used for the study in July and August covers 5 weeks, I didn't even get through the week 1 content with the students.... there's just so much to share.

During one of the discussions, we focused on the following passage from the first chapter of Jeremiah:

"Alas, Sovereign Lord," I said, "I do not know how to speak; I am too young." But the Lord said to me, "Do not say 'I am too young.' You must go to everyone I send you to and say whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you and will rescue you," declares the Lord.

Over the few days on the retreat, the students, at times, struggled to find their voices, to answer the admittedly challenging questions that were posed to them, so we reread this passage several times. As I have been involved in our youth and catechism programs over the last couple of years, I have seen our students being asked questions that I don't think most of our adults have the courage to consider or answer. Why would we ask this of our students? Because they will rise to the challenge. If not in the moment, they will ponder the questions asked and know that they've been challenged with questions that I'd bet are rarely asked of teenagers. Our expectations are high. That's what I want for my children. That's the experience I want for myself and our congregation.

My experience with the students and adults in the last couple of years in our congregation is that our students often feel safer and more courageous than the adults in sharing their thoughts on difficult questions about themselves and God. Why? I can speculate an answer to that question, but can't solve it. What I will try to do is continue to find the answers for myself and help lead the students and adults to learn and grow in their faith. I believe we

are transitioning into a church that understands that challenges and discomfort are what lead to growth. At least that's what the key leaders believe. The congregation as a whole needs to believe in that to make a true shift.

At 44 years of age, I need to hear the verse above repeated as much as I believe our students do. This chapter is Jeremiah's calling, God calling him to lead and speak to the people of Judah, to tell them of the devastation and destruction to come. What an unlucky, virtually impossible assignment, but through all of it, Jeremiah continued to follow God's instructions and plan. There's nothing special about Jeremiah. What we see over and over again throughout scripture is that God choses ordinary people to do the difficult and extraordinary things.

"I do not know how to speak; I am too <u>young</u>." If we are middle-aged or older, maybe we should each consider replacing the word "young" with other words that might fit our particular obstacle in various contexts. It could be with your spouse, children, at work, at church, etc. I'm sure most of us have a few words we could insert that we use as an excuse not to speak. You fill in the blank – old, tired, busy, inexperienced, afraid, timid, angry, frustrated, apathetic, indifferent.... But then know that God would respond by saying, "Do not say 'I am too ______."

As I read this passage over and over again, I continue to turn to the last phrase... I will rescue you. God doesn't say, I am with you and it will be easy or I am with you and no one will disagree or make it difficult. God does say I WILL RESCUE YOU. The word "rescue" is defined as saving someone from a dangerous or distressing situation — this is the point at which we fail, when things go wrong and the only one we can turn to is God.

Recognizing that we had a large collection of food, Becky called me for help. St John's volunteered to provide individually bagged breakfasts during two days of camp. Pastor Rebecca Knox had just left a late night planning meeting just days before camp was to start when I was on a call with her to schedule our deliveries. I asked if there were any additional items we might be able to provide, and I told her about the food items we collected for the summer program that had never happened. She thankfully accepted our offer of fruit cups, applesauce cups, fruit snacks, and granola bars to supplement the snacks and lunches throughout the 4 day camp. They had just been discussing during the meeting that they might be short on food.

Thank you to each person who added food items to our collection bins. Thank you to the volunteers that came on Monday and Thursday nights to pack bags. Thank you to the volunteers who woke up early to load up and deliver the bags to Oley fairgrounds where camp was being held.

"Surviving Life's Messy Plot Twists" was the subject this week in my other summer learning class called, "Messy People". We learned "God is looking for people who are AVAILABLE, INTERRUPTIBLE, and TRUSTWORTHY." During our class discussion I shared all of the things I mentioned above in this article and they encouraged me to share this message with all of you.

We need to make ourselves available to God's plan for us. Let God interrupt the plans we thought we had for ourselves. Be trustworthy to use all he has given to us for his plan for us.

Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms.

What Is Stephen Ministry?

Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ (Galatians 6:2, NRSV)

Stephen Ministry offers a proven and effective way to organize, equip, and supervise a team of congregation members - called Stephen Ministers - to provide high-quality, one-to-one, Christ-centered care to people in the congregation and the community experiencing life difficulties.

Who's Involved in Stephen Ministry?

Stephen Leaders are church staff, lay leaders, and pastors trained to provide ongoing leadership for their congregation's Stephen Ministry. They are equipped for this key role through the Bridge Leader's Training Course offered by Stephen Ministries St. Louis.

Stephen Ministers are congregation members trained by their Stephen Leaders to offer care to people who are hurting. A Stephen Minister typically has one care receiver at a time and meets with that person once a week for about an hour.

Care receivers are individuals in the congregation or community who are going through a crisis or life difficulty. Potential care receivers first meet with a pastor or Stephen Leader, who assesses their needs for care and matches them with a Stephen Minister. The caring relationship lasts for as long as the need persists.

The Blessings of Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry multiplies blessings throughout the church and community.

- Congregations carry out Christ's commandment to "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12 RSV) in a powerful and practical way.
- Pastors have a team of gifted, trained, and committed lay caregivers ready to minister to hurting people.
- Laypeople nurture and use their gifts in meaningful ministry, growing spiritually as they serve others.
- People who are hurting have a caring Christian presence to provide emotional and spiritual support.

In short, Stephen Ministry helps carry out the mission of the church.

NEW BAPTISMAL FONT

Have you wondered about our baptismal font?

Do you remember what the former baptismal font looked like? It was a wooden base, painted white with a darkly stained top. In the top sat an aluminum bowl.



Our current font is much different. It is cobalt blue, hand-blown glass — complementing the blue in the stained glass windows. The curves of the bowl flow organically like waves of water. It is a commissioned piece from the Taylor Backes Studio that is located in Boyertown. The table it sits on was also commissioned by a local woodworker, Allan Stauffer. We are proud to have local artists and their Godgiven gifts represented in our sanctuary!

Taylor Backes has pieces exhibited in the Smithsonian Institution, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Corning Museum of Glass and

others. It is "a unique glass studio dedicated to creation and production of fine functional, architectural and sculptural design."- taylorbackes.com. This studio was the idea of Karla Trinkley and Will Dexter. The studio name comes from the maiden names of their mothers. Trinkley and Dexter are artists who have exhibited in fine art galleries,



combining high quality craftsmanship with fine design. Visit taylor-bakes.com to see examples of their art, classes that are offered through the Glass Art Institute and to buy online.




