## EPIPHANY: A SHORT BIBLE STUDY

First, read Matthew 2: 1-12.

Epiphany is a Greek word that means appearance, coming into the light, or a revealing. Many of us have epiphanies when we come to an understanding of a difficult problem. The "light bulb" comes on – an "ah-ha" moment occurs – and all becomes clear.

"God uses any means available for revealing truth to those who seek it." (p.29, <u>The Lutheran</u>, Jan 2007.) The tools God uses in the story of the magi are astrology and scripture.

The Bible gives no names for the magi, nor does it reveal a number. There may have been more or less than the legendary three. And, they were definitely not kings. They were possibly clergy in the Zoroastrian religion. This religion was prevalent in ancient Persia, modern day Iran. Today these men might be called astrologers.

The study of scripture often involves comparing and contrasting. In the story of the magi, the motives of Herod, the scribes and chief priests, and the magi are vey different. Herod was afraid his kingship would be challenged (by a little child in diapers!). So, he called on the Jewish chief priests and scribes to determine where this usurper king would be born, but the Jews did not follow the magi. The magi, however, acted on the information they had. They journeyed a great distance, checked in with Herod, and went to a house in Bethlehem to worship, bringing gifts.

Yes, the magi came late – but they came. They took a great risk. This is a story of discipleship, of following Jesus. We have no additional sightings of the magi. They exit the Gospel of Matthew without a trace. But they leave behind a question for us: What do we do with our knowledge of Jesus?
