

While doing so we must seek to go beyond knowing one another and join in getting to know God more deeply. Over the past few years people have expressed in every place I've travelled how they feel disconnected and more isolated than ever before in their lives. So, let's help by being a place where all people feel they belong and are accepted. How many times today did you hear someone say they feel stressed? Can we be a place where we model balance and healthy life management (I know!)? The "great resignation" has been fueled with feelings of having had the life drained out of them while in pursuit of possessions. The pace of life has left many feeling overwhelmed. Can we be a learning community where all can receive the help they need during times of transition? God help us and those we will let down if we can't.

God, open my eyes that I might see my church as you see it. Let me see where change needs to take place, even if it is painful to me. And use me, I pray, to be an instrument of that change whatever the cost.



### THOUGHTS ON JOSHUA 2, HEBREWS 11:31, AND JAMES 2:25

Most of us know the story of Joshua and how he and the Hebrews brought down the walls of Jericho. There is another critical figure in this story: Rahab.

First, a bit about Jericho. Jericho was a walled city/state. It was located at the entrance of the mountain passes. Thus, it had a strategic position. It had a double wall – one inner and one outer. In between the walls were rooms. These rooms were used for storage or stables. Only the poorest people, the outcasts and the prostitutes/harlots lived in these rooms.

Rahab, a harlot, apparently kept up with the news. She knew about the dry passing at the Red Sea and about the demise of the two kings of the Amorites. The mighty acts of God convinced her that Jericho was doomed. So, she lodged the two Hebrew spies. When someone snitched on her, she hid the spies under the flax drying on the roof. Once the immediate danger had passed by Rahab -

giving the authorities a false trail to follow – she negotiated her own terms with Joshua's spies.

She first issued a statement of her faith (v. 11b). She then asked the spies to "swear to her by the Lord" for protection for her and her family. After a bit of back and forth, the promise was made. Rahab let the men out via

a rope through a window, with details of travel plans for them: "Hide in the hills for three days until the pursuers return." To ensure Rahab's safety, she was told to tie a scarlet cord in the window – the first GPS!

Rahab's faith is what saved her, a Canaanite woman, whose faith was accompanied by works. Already in the Old Testament God is welcoming an outcast (John 3:16), the inclusion

of a people not of the chosen nation of Israel. Accordingly, her faith is recounted in the 11<sup>th</sup> chapter of Hebrews and James references it in the 2<sup>nd</sup> chapter of his epistle.

Sometimes admitting our faith causes us to act differently and can be terrifying. But, "without faith it is impossible to please him, for he who comes to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder to those who see him" (Hebrews 11:6). I pray we all can emulate Rahab – even a little bit.

## FLAX – IMPORTANT EVEN TODAY

BY FAITH THE WALLS OF JERICHO FELL DOWN AFTER THEY HAD BEEN

CIRCLED FOR SEVEN DAYS.

As flax is mentioned throughout the Bible, I thought a primer on flax might be helpful.

Flax grows about 3' high. It produces blue flowers. It was grown in Egypt prior to the Exodus and later in Canaan. When harvested, the stalks are soaked and laid out to dry. (In Rahab's story the stalks were dried on the roof.) Fibers are then separated from the stalks by beating (the two steps are called breaking and scutching) and then by combing (also called hackling). Once the fibers are exposed, they are spun into yarns and threads. These are used to make linen fabrics or rope.

Also, flax seed supplies oil when pressed. It is called linseed oil and today is

used in the manufacturing of linoleum and pharmaceuticals.
