The Gospel is a Stumbling Block

The Apostle Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 1:23 Stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles

Theologian and author Paul Tillich reminds us:

The danger is stumbling over the wrong thing

We Assume the Moral of this Story is to be Humble

If that is the case – We might just as well say...

Lord, we thank you that we are not like other people: hypocrites, overly pious, self-righteous, or even like that Pharisee

Is the Pharisee lying?

Does he not adhere faithfully to the law?

Does he not meet the standards spoken of by Luke and by Jesus in his employment of the term righteous?

It's not that the Pharisee speaks falsely

The Pharisee misses the true nature of his blessing by trusting in himself

The Pharisee claims to be righteous ... based on their own accomplishments

The Tax Collector... relies entirely on God's mercy

Who's in? Who's out?

Anytime you draw a line between 'who's in' and 'who's out'

you'll find God on the other side

The Pharisee leaves the temple and returns home just as he came – righteous

The tax Collector returns home justified having done nothing to deserve it.

He returns home justified on the basis of God's divine declaration!

The Moral of this Story...

We find ourselves with nothing to claim but our dependence on God's mercy.
