WHAT DOES GOD HAVE IN STORE FOR 2023? Dear Friends,

Happy New Year!

I'm chuckling already about how many articles and advertisements we will all be reading over the next few weeks about New Year's resolutions, people joining gyms, and going on diets. Those thoughts took me in the direction of thanking God for how most of the exciting things that happen in our lives aren't very carefully planned out ahead of time. They probably don't just happen spontaneously either. Did you plan the moment you would meet the love of your life? Did you say, "Hey, next Tuesday I'll meet Jesus along the way and say, 'yes' to His call for me to follow"? Some (and I agree) think our growth moments happen because we do two things at the same time. We set a course of action and simultaneously stay open to whatever emerges along the way. That's called strategic process if you study organizational systems. It's also called journeying in faith if you study the Bible. Faith is always the gracious and surprising accomplishment of God.

Nothing will happen if you aren't intentional. Even a failure is better than doing nothing. Join the gym. Start that diet. Just do it! Many faith-based organizations I know can't make a decision to save their souls or anyone else's for that matter. They stay stuck in patterns of the past that keep them safe and comfortable, blaming others in the present for all that afflicts them, until it's too late. In other words, nothing will happen, unless you decide to do something, but no matter what you do, the outcome isn't ultimately going to be up to you.

The book of Acts opens with Jesus giving final instructions to his followers. Jesus tells them "...you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the Earth." (Acts 1:8). It wasn't a lot to go on, but it was enough. Jesus' followers walked away with a sense of direction and began a journey together that would lead them to places they never could have imagined. They believed the Holy Spirit was at work in, through and all around them. When they saw the Spirit at work, they joined in. None of these things could've happened if they hadn't been willing to move out and follow the course Jesus, their leader, had given them. Was it without bumps along the way? Absolutely not! Literally, for God's sake, Jesus had to die. But they didn't really plan anything that happened along the way. When they did try to plan things out carefully, it didn't work out so well at all. Just ask Mathias. He's the only disciple who was chosen, using anything resembling a plan. The other disciples, caught up by the idea of replacing the Judas, actually developed a list of job qualifications! And Mathias met them (Acts 1:15-26). Scripture records virtually nothing about Mathias as he disappears from the story and is never heard from again. How much of what happened did somebody (besides God) actually plan ahead of time? How much of it happened because somebody was paying attention to what God was doing, and dared to join in? (Seeing Through New Eyes, A Renewal Enterprise, Inc. 2010)

One of my favorite people on the planet, as a little girl, would say with open arms, "Where go? What do?" There's wisdom in that little girls' questions. We should take those words out for a spin and enjoy what God has in store for us in 2023.

As you read this, know the members of St. John's heading to Cuernavaca, Mexico are incredibly excited to learn more about the programs of Wellspring Karitas on the ground in the communities being served. We leave Boyertown on Wednesday, January 11 and head to Elizabeth, NJ where we will spend the night so we can catch our early morning flight to Mexico City. We return on Tuesday, January 17, arriving in Boyertown that evening.

Please pray for our team members: Pastor Bob, Becky and Scott Scheiry, Shannon Omlor, Amanda Ehst, Jen and Camryn Friz, John and Ashley Gheer, Bev Blake, Jen Schlegel, and Tracey Smith. Tracey is representing Karitas and is joining our delegation. We'll all get to meet her in person when she worships with us on Sunday, January 8.

We begin the new year in the midst of the twelve days of Christmas that culminate with Epiphany on January 6. The three wise men travelled from afar, following the star of Bethlehem, to bear witness to the presence of our King. They offered gifts to our Lord and Savior. Imagine what others might have thought of these wise men who brought these valuable gifts to a baby of such lowly and humble origins. They brought gifts fit for a King.

In many places around the world, Epiphany, the "little Christmas," is celebrated with gifts even more so than Christmas Day. This year, the offering taken during our Friday, January 6 Epiphany service will be put toward purchasing tools to equip ALEM's second team of individuals who repair wheelchairs in Cuernavaca and the surrounding area. We will be purchasing some tools to ship, and other tools will be purchased in Mexico. The ALEM program has three goals: to repair wheelchairs for those in need, to give people with disabilities purpose and community, and to open the eyes of those in the community to the worth and fruitful productiveness of the disabled. Please consider a monetary gift to help support this program that indeed lifts up those others seen as lowly and humble.

Wellspring Karitas Foundation is committed to Building a more Beautiful World from the Bottom Up. Wellspring Karitas does indeed lift up people who some consider to be lowly – people with disabilities, people with hunger, children at risk of dropping out of school, indigenous farmers. Wellspring Karitas does this "lifting and building up" by supporting programs that empower people and build community. One program includes a preschool in a squatter's community that provides education and feeds breakfast to 150 children every day! Another education initiative supports young people transitioning from elementary school through middle school, where there is a high dropout rate. Another program supported by Wellspring Karitas is a group of fair trade restaurants, employing people with disabilities and sourcing food from indigenous farmers. All profits are put back into the community.

When local people identify local needs and local solutions, a healthy community is built! A community that people invest and reinvest in. A community where relationships thrive. The type of community I think we'd all like to live in. We can help make this happen for the people we'll encounter in Cuernavaca, and we'll learn how we can join in to further serve in our own community and further develop healthy community relationships.

Many ministries respond to community needs, but when a ministry is developed to get to the source of the concern, then we are living out our baptismal call to strive for justice and peace in all the world.

Indeed this is what God asks of us.

Thank you for your prayers and your contributions. We look forward to going and learning, and returning and serving. We'll be sharing our experiences with the congregation when we return, including ways that the trip will bear fruit and plant seeds in our own community.

As our council has done its best to prayerfully navigate these complexities, we were constantly reminded that tough decisions are never going to satisfy everyone. While trying to make decisions for the safety and care of the congregation about worshiping in person or online only, wearing masks and having ropes on the pews there was still the underlying, core "business" of the church that needed to continue. And during this time of transition of the church, the way the council works together and where it puts its energy is critical for the church's future.

Finances, how we spend our endowments, building maintenance, bees in the steeple, the perpetual search for an organist, preschool budget and expectations, constitution and by-law amendments, events added to the calendar that need volunteers, and of course, the need for planning using the calendar, database and task lists! 

THE SHACK



PART 2 (read Part 1 in December's newsletter)



A cataclysmic event (e.g., a flood, a fire, an auto accident, a death, etc.), generally, changes the life of the person experiencing it. What that person does with the change is dependent on the person and their faith.

The Shack is a work of fiction involving a cataclysmic event. I believe that God can use anything to fulfill his purposes – even a novel. This article is not a book review; it is an exploration of one of the biblical concepts found within its pages.

Relationship – how often have we heard this concept from the pulpit! Our relationship with God is the most important. Read I John 4:9-11:

"God shows us his love for us when he sent his only Son into the world to give us life. 10Real love isn't our love for God, but his love for us. God sent his Son to be the sacrifice by which our sins are forgiven. 11Dear friends, since God loved us this much, we must love each other. (CEV, italics-mine)

Relationship with God allows us to love and to serve in every situation. Consider Mackenzie's mental gyrations when he is in the cavern. Was he judging God for allowing his daughter to be brutally raped and murdered? How often have we/I criticized/judged? privately, of course. Is this the love our relationship with God expects?

"All love and relationship is possible for you *only* because it already exists within me, within God myself. Love is *not* the limitation; love is the flying. I am love." (Papa speaking to Mackenzie, p. 103, italics – mine)

Read I John 4:18-20. An example of how I failed God's love: while working at the Career Center, a tall, dark-skinned student followed me in the hallway. For some reason, I felt afraid. I had seen the student before; they were enrolled in a friend's program; and I do have African-American friends. Why was I afraid? I don't know. I do know that I felt ashamed. What I didn't have was a relationship with that student. "The one who fears is not perfected in love." (I John 4:18c NASB) I have a long way to go in my relationship with God.

To return to <u>The Shack</u>: we all have tragedies in our lives – some more devastating than others. But tragedies are not orchestrated by God. He can, though, use them for his purposes. God will use them for good and to give the most loving outcome.

Read Romans 8:28. By embracing God's love in the midst of pain or suffering, there is grace. Mackenzie found this grace through forgiveness – his for those who wronged him and God's for him.

There are many theological concepts in <u>The Shack</u>. Here is a list of a few of them:

The power of love is greater than hate.

Jesus came to give us life.

God's love gives us freedom.

God does not force his love on us.

A relationship with God involves trust.

Each of these concepts could provide sermons (or newsletter articles).

To close, read the following:

"For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39 NASB)


LIGHTING PROJECT

The lighting project for the Sanctuary and Narthex started as a refresh of the lighting system that was remaining from before the renovation. The project will upgrade our lights from the current fluorescents to more efficient LED technology. When looking at the project as a whole, and through various meetings, it became apparent that this renovation needed to be more than just an upgrade, but a look at moving the Sanctuary forward into the future. We now have new technologies in the Sanctuary such as a video system that would benefit from the upgrade. We needed to look at how the overall lighting system would affect the projection screen while maintaining adequate lighting levels at the chancel. After review of multiple options, we have decided to maintain the overall lighting layout by replacing the current lighting fixtures of the Sanctuary and providing better light output control, along with adding several lights to aid with the lighting of the chancel. In addition to the work in the Sanctuary, we will be replacing the Narthex lighting fixtures to better align with the new fixtures installed in the Sanctuary further upgrading the church.

After the lighting fixtures were selected, we now had an opportunity to optimize the lighting controls for not only the congregation but also our on-line viewers. We are going to not only maintain some of the current lighting controls, but also add to them to provide even more flexibility with all of the fixtures being dimmable. The new lighting control system will provide more flexibility and easier use.

We are now in the pre-construction phase of the project where lighting fixtures are being ordered and construction details are being coordinated with the construction team. Once the lighting project is complete, we will have a Sanctuary poised to move us into the future providing us with an even greater worship experience, not only for those in person in the Sanctuary, but also for those who are viewing online.
