I was in Mexico visiting Wellspring Karitas with our team from St. John's, learning, laughing, singing, playing games, and smiling – I couldn't stop smiling, when I started reading Stephanie Speller's book, *Radical Welcoming: Embracing God, The Other and the Spirit of Transformation*. She hooked me before I had a chance to read a single word she wrote. It was in the introduction where The Rt. Rev. (Bishop) Steven Charleston of the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, Massachusetts describes one of his congregations "as a "half-way house" because so many of our folks had either left the church and were now half-way back in, or they were half-way out of the church and were just giving church (not necessarily God) one more try before they gave up. It was a great community. A challenging and engaged community. A place full of unique and extraordinary people."

Could we be such a place? Is it possible that our second chance at a future filled with hope might just begin with embracing all people as they did? A good start is to get past the lie embedded in "All Are Welcome". We know the truth. We know ourselves. There seems to always be those each of us are unable to embrace and accept and love. We are human after all. That's where God comes in. Well, maybe. God says, "Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me." That's Come to the Table. Or is it? The offer is there. The opportunity to commune is there. And still, God says, Here I am! I'm knocking. Can you hear me? I know I'm what your heart longs for desperately. Please let go of the distractions. Let go. Let go of self. Stop grasping for that which can only bring you temporary happiness. Let go and join me. I want to come to **your** table!

A place of Radical Welcome. St. John's can be a place where we will discover together the blueprint God offers for planned growth, change, and mission. In her book Stephanie "shows us that there is a great, untapped source of strength for every congregation. It is the presence of The Other within the neighborhood - that group of persons who stand just beyond the social/cultural threshold of the congregation." If we get to know our neighbors and they get to know us, we will not only expand the vision of our congregation but revitalize it in ways that could never be realized otherwise. Think about it. If we deny those we name as Other – we deny God. For surely if we deny them, they must have come from someone other than **our** God. Radical welcome shows us how we need one another, and even more importantly, how we translate that potential into the blessings of a church renewed.

Please know this takes work, effort, and faith – trust will come later. This is not about how we should all be nice to strangers at Cookies under the Cross. "Radical welcome is not the welcome wagon. It IS the heart of evangelism: the transformation of human life from the isolated to the integrated. Radical welcome is a process. It is a process by which isolated parts of a whole community are brought together in creative and compassionate ways to generate a more integrated, balanced, and dynamic mixture. It's what creates a community that works well, prays well, and plans well together."

Deciding to step outside for the sake of the gospel will reveal to us that "there is no such place as a neutral space." "Welcome" still conjures the dynamics of inside and outside, with different groups on different sides of the threshold. To speak of "welcome" is still to center the one in power, the one who gets to decide who comes in and who does not. Yes, we are both changed, but someone owns the house and the table. Someone decides if The Other is "welcome" or not. In short, "Stephanie is calling us to a much more mature and nuanced understanding of what it means for any congregation to truly open its doors to community. It is not a matter of just accepting difference. It is a matter of creating something new. Much like the Holy Scriptures on which it is firmly grounded, radical welcome talks about new life for the people of God. The call to take on the challenges of "radical welcome" is for the growth of the community, not only in numbers, but in spirit, imagination, and strength." Our future as a congregation, grounded in the gospel, is a future that extends the love of Christ in all directions.



PRESCHOOL NEWS

We are now firmly into 2023. We are settling down from the holiday season and the great times we spent with our families as we celebrated the birth of our King! While we slow in all the spending from the holidays, there is much that takes place in the coming months. As we start to live the 2023 that God intends for each of us, we have many holidays that are intended to remind us of our past and help us remember everything we need to be thankful for. In February alone we have Valentine's Day, Mardi Gras (the start of Lent), and Presidents Day.

The preschool has a lot that takes place in February. First, we celebrate the life of Saint Valentine, where we begin to teach our students to be devoted to one another in love and to honor one another above ourselves. We have our students

make cards for homebound members of St. John's so they know they are not forgotten. The students also share cards amongst themselves and craft a gift for their parents. We then celebrate the life of Dr. Suess, who provided many life lessons for children in the form of stories. A story is read each day while we have activities that engage the kids in the lesson he taught.

While this year gives us a lot to be thankful for, there will be times we each find ourselves or those around us being tested. Pray when needed and remember to help and support those around you in honor of Saint Valentine.

WHAT KIND OF GIFT WOULD YOU BRING?

"...and opening their treasures, they presented to him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh." Matthew 2:11c.

We can think that these are unusual gifts for a baby or a small child. Perhaps we would bring diapers, wipes, and a casserole. They, however, are useful gifts. The child and his parents were poor and were sent to Egypt in rapid haste. They would need lodging and food. All three gifts would help with these needs.

My bag of Penderly's frankincense tells us that it is "an aromatic gum resin from a tree in the Boswellia family. This family of *Burseracea* plants produce balms and resins. They are found in Somalia, Sudan, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Oman, Yemen and India. They are deciduous trees, which are wounded in March and April. The resin is collected throughout summer and autumn and then dried. The volatile oils are used in perfume and incense. It was valued in Biblical times as medicine, in worship, in embalming and in fumigation.

Myrrh gum is dried aromatic sap from *commiphora myrrha*, a small bushy tree found in Ethiopia, Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Oman, Aden and India. The grower makes a small cut in the bark; the resin leaks out and is collected. The resin is stored for 3 months or until it hardens into globules. It is used as the main ingredient in holy anointing oil, in perfume, in embalming and in fumigating. In Jesus' time it was an important trade item that had greater value than gold.

So, perhaps these gifts of the magi had particular use for the young family. Joseph and Mary were without means. Yes, Joseph was a carpenter – but that's a difficult trade to perform while travelling. God provided, through three foreigners, just what they needed to get to Egypt and then back to Nazareth.

May we recognize unusual gifts as being provided by God.


