


Faith Practices Have Changed

Baptisms today occur in the context of congregational worship



Five central faith practices that grow out of our Baptism in Christ.

- live among God's faithful people;
- hear the Word of God and share in the Lord's Supper;
- proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed;
- serve all people following the example of Jesus; and,
- strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

Now is the time to intentionally choose healthy patterns to offset the grief and lament related to these times as we shift to a new normal.
