**Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing,
whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.
(Philippians 4:8)**

The apostle Paul wants to guide us in our thinking. Why? Because he knows that our thoughts matter. What we are thinking about affects our relationships, it determines our choices, and it guides us through life. Paul encourages us to decide carefully what to think about. “Think about these things,” he writes. When we think about the ‘right’ things, we are more likely to do what is loving and compassionate and forgiving. Be quick to forgive an offense. Forgive as quickly and completely as the Master forgave you (Colossians 3).

A number of years ago, one of my friends took the time to draw an outline of their home and a drawn-to-scale map of their flowerbeds. With a bulb catalog in his hand, he evolved an absurdly elaborate plan - not only plotting exact locations for each bulb but projecting a scheme to place each one with both sequence and color coordination in mind. I remember him telling me what he wrote in his book *“Gifts of an Uncommon Life - The Practice of Contemplative Activism”*, *House and Garden* magazine here I come! If you like what follows know that all but a few comments are written by the Rev. Dr. Howard E. Friend, Jr.

“He (Howard) planned the shopping trip list to include two dozen green, cardboard, quart-size berry containers, snugly fit into cut-down liquor cartons with a handful of Popsicle sticks and a marker to make little labels. He worked deliberately at the local nursery placing a handful of bulbs, located by variety and color, into those cartons, with its identifying Popsicle stick.”

“He secured the cartons in the trunk of his car and headed home. As he turned onto his street, a basketball tumbled over the curb with a youngster in hot pursuit. He instinctively swerved and hit the break. “The bulbs!” He parked, popped the trunk, and there they were, scattered everywhere. Every berry container empty.”

What to do? He writes, “I had no choice - start digging. Red tulips, purple iris, blue crocus, and yellow daffodils found a place in the ground. He tried to instruct each to become what he wanted it to be with some intentionality however hopeless the likely outcome would be. “Springtime turned out to be a delightful adventure. Each day he and his wife would walk outside to see what bulbs have popped up and where. Spontaneity, serendipity, and

surprise reigned.” In many ways, he said the randomness was more wonderful than any arrangement his initial compulsive plan could have yielded. **“The secret was encoded in the heart of each bulb. Their God-given essence burst forth into a wondrous array of shape and color.”**

“People – planted in good soil, watered and tended, growing at their natural time and pace – release their in-born, God-given essence. Wonders of shape and color begin (have begun) to grace the (our) congregational landscape.”

If you’re still wondering why the past nine years have been filled with hundreds of sermons, articles, and conversations focusing on basic core values and principles maybe the above story has revealed the answer. It’s planting season. Note the caution at the beginning of this article.

My mentor, Howard Friend, has taught me to move beyond seeking individuals who have been either assigned, appointed, volunteered, or recruited. He taught me many years ago to ask members basic and essential questions like, how is God calling you now? He taught me to ask what gifts do you have for serving that you want to tap into at the current time? Discernment, if we’re speaking biblically. What purpose is God guiding you to and where is your passion?

He also warned me that if I pursue leadership in this manner, I will very likely receive “good-news resignations”. As people begin to name their calling and gifts, clarify their purpose, and release their passion, they will feel compelled to serve at the church in fuller alignment with that discernment. When discernment and faithfulness replace appointment, assignment, volunteering, and recruitment as a basic organizational strategy, any short term, chaos or inconceivable yields, my experience suggests, will result in deeper and more durable commitment, as well as more effective and joyful service.

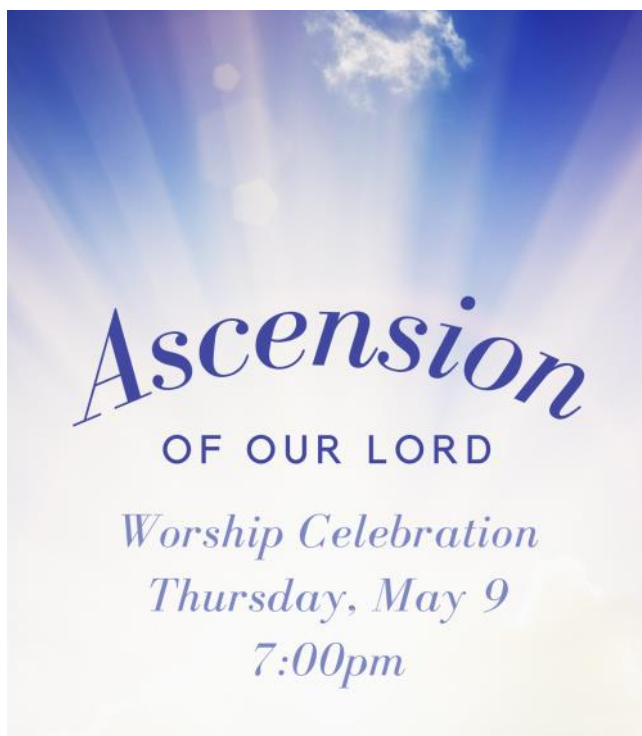


TAG – YOU'RE IT!

Jesus has been raised from the dead and has appeared in a variety of ways to convince people of God's power. On Ascension Day, Jesus is taken to heaven, but not without promises and action plans for those who remain. Wait here! (Ready?) You will receive power to be witnesses throughout the whole earth. You will receive a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know God. You will receive an inheritance. (Set . . .) You will know hope. You, the church, are Christ Jesus' body, even as his body disappears from sight. (Go!)

It's like a holy game of tag in which Jesus tags followers, saying, "You're it. Now, you're *me* in the world." These are words we gather in worship to wait for, and we don't have long to wait. As we dip fingers in the font, we touch promises. We're a part of Christ's family. As we meet at the table, we taste promises. We become Christ's body. And on Pentecost—Holy Spirit, come—this is the one who comes as promised, to call, bring together, inspire, and make holy.

These promises connected to Jesus' ascension result in the biblical stories about followers who worship, bless God, gain hopeful attitudes and a sense of mission. The two men in white robes urged those gazing up toward heaven to get going! We also need a similar prompt: This living Jesus comes the same way as you saw him go. So watch for the presence of Christ, powerfully making the church his body. Watch for the presence of Christ, whenever the church pours itself out in love for others. As we come to know him and the hope to which he has called us, may we have open minds, enlightened hearts, and be clothed with power from on high. (sundaysandseasons.com)

THE HOLY SPIRIT'S GROANING

Few sounds capture a groan like birth pangs. It is the raw sound of life and birth as well as of pain. It is the guttural desire for the end of the waiting for what has been anticipated and desired. For any who have been present through such an event, it is difficult to ever forget. It is in equal parts beautiful, stunning, and holy, as well as raw, painful, and horrific. "Creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves . . . groan inwardly while we wait for adoption," writes Paul to the church in Rome. He describes aptly that painful wail of our souls for the redemption we know so well, the restoration of all things promised in Christ. As Lutherans we know this all too well as the "now but not yet" proposition of our faith. We have been told of the return of the Messiah. We prepare for this coming and see how the whole of creation groans for her own restoration. We join this creation waiting for our own hearts, souls, and bodies to be restored. We know this is coming and as in pains of labor groan for this reality. While we wait, we are given a midwife, a Spirit of God to join us in our waiting for the birth of a new world and a new reality. This gift is given this day, the day of Pentecost. SAYING YES

Reflections on St. John's January trip to Mexico

Many of those in our congregation are familiar with Alem, but if you are not, Alem is an incredible program that brings together and lifts up disabled people in wheelchairs. Within Alem they work to erase the harsh stereotype and stigma surrounding disabilities by repairing wheelchairs for those in need and taking in people facing hardship. All while doing this they keep the phrase "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle" true in their work. It is clear that this program has proven to be successful in pursuing their purpose because they have grown remarkably within the last couple of years. On the Wellspring Karitas website (karitasfoundation.org) it is written that in 2013 they repaired 350 wheelchairs and now they are repairing 3,500 wheelchairs a year. The change has allowed them to spread their project and touch many more lives throughout 5 states in Mexico, but they have hit a stagnant state. The team is unable to accommodate for the growth and with an increasing amount of people relying on the program, they are in need of growth and change.

While at dinner one night during our trip a conversation about this situation arose. I asked Erik Friend (President and Executive Director of Wellspring Karitas), "Are you afraid that Alem will lose its meaning if it grows any bigger?" He admitted that yes, that is something he worries about and he is not sure how to solve the issue at hand yet. Change can be difficult and really how do we face it without being overpowered by fear? I definitely do

not know the answer but I believe that, although Erik and Alem are presented with this issue, they have long been doing the right thing. Alem arose from a simple "yes" to a question that they were not quite sure they really could say "yes" to. On the Karitas website under the Alem tab it is written, "people saw wheelchairs and saw a fully equipped shop and began to ask if we could repair their wheelchairs. So, we became a vocational training center and productive facility repairing all types of wheelchairs". The team's ability to say "yes" is impressive, they rarely say "no". I believe that this is a requisite for success, without answering "yes" they would not be where they are today. Imagine the things this flourishing program could do if they continued to just say "yes". Alem could even become a part of our own community.

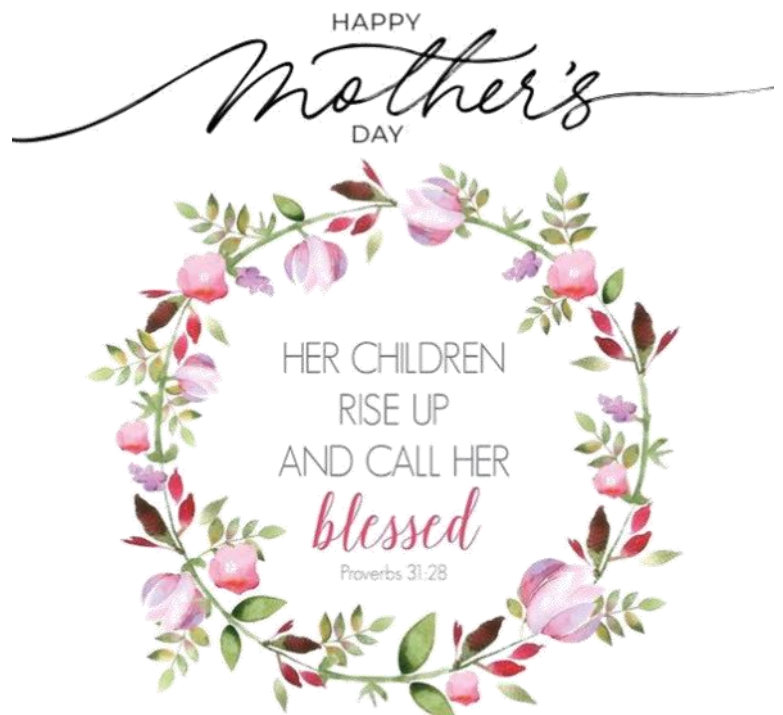
