Ministry Action Plan and Next Steps

Earlier this year, our finance team introduced the vision of preparing **Statement of Intent Cards** as part of the 2026 Ministry Action Plan (MAP).

LUTHER AND LUTHERANISM

Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michaelangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, “captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans.”

In these days Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. “I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God.” Then, in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a “merciful God justifies us by faith ... I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates.”

What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God’s mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, “Faith is God’s work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God’s grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times.”

This discovery set Luther’s life on a new course —both his own life and his public service as a preacher and teacher. When a church-endorsed sales team came to the Wittenberg area in October, 1517, Luther was concerned that the promotion and sale of indulgences undermined the promise of God’s unreserved mercy in Jesus and the faith that trusts that promise. His *95 Theses* or *Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences* became the first of a life-long stream of books, sermons, letters, essays, even hymns in which he expressed his confidence in this life-giving promise from God, the Gospel, and its liberating implications for all of life in church and society.

DO YOU SHOP AT REDNER'S MARKET?

St. John's Preschool collects Redner's receipts which are used to earn money for our school.

Receipts are totaled monthly and taken back to Redner's. After about 6 weeks we receive a check for 1% of the total. A typical year yields approximately \$700 – \$800. This money is then used to purchase educational items above and beyond our operational budget. Simply bring your receipts to church or preschool and place in either the dropbox located outside the preschool entrance (exterior) or the dropbox on the Parish House main office door (interior).

You must use your Redner's Club Card each time you checkout in order for the receipt to count. If you don't have a Club Card ask at the Customer Service Desk.

Jael Did What!?!

Her name is pronounced yā ĕl.

Deborah is a prophet, a judge, a leader of military men. She predicted that Sisera, the feared leader of the Jabin's army, would die by a woman's hand – but not by Deborah's hand. This would be a blow to Barak's ego and to the Canaanites. So, who was Jael and what did she do?

As the battle with the Israelites was finishing, Sisera jumped out of his chariot and fled. Jael was standing by the opening of her tent and invited him in. Jael was the wife of Heber, a Kenite. The Kenites were a Midianite tribe who had not picked a side in this battle. Remember, Moses had run to Midian to escape Pharaoh's wrath after Moses killed the Egyptian who was beating a Hebrew. While in Midian, Moses married Zipporah, daughter of Jethro, a Midianite.)

As is the Hebrew custom, and because he asked, Jael provided for his needs: something to drink, a cover/blanket for sleep. Sisera asked her to stand in the doorway to deny that she has seen him. Because Sisera was exhausted from the battle, he fell asleep immediately. Jael, however, retrieved a tent peg and a hammer. She drove that tent peg through Sisera's temple. He would no longer move. Jael now stood guilty of violating the laws of hospitality, of falsehood, treachery, and murder.

Jael went to meet Barak as he pursued Sisera and asked him to come into her tent. And, there Barak saw Sisera dead at Jael's feet. Deborah's song of triumph is recorded in Chapter 5 in the book of Judges. Verses 24-27 praise Jael's actions. Do take time to read these few verses. They are amazing!

There are three theories as to why Jael killed Sisera. I quote here from *Meet Me at the Well* (pg 58):

"First theory: Jael is the wife of a tribal chief. By their laws no man can enter her tent without asking the chief or speaking to one of the other men of the tribe. By violating the tribe's laws, Sisera gives up all rights to its protection. Even worse, by speaking to a woman without a man of her tribe present, he shames her. He also asks for water, intimating that she is a poor hostess for not offering it, thus compounding his sins utterly.

Second theory: Jael is a priestess in a religious community. Knowing this, Sisera comes specifically to ask for sanctuary. But like Deborah, Jael is directly in touch with God, who orders her to kill Sisera.

Third theory: Sisera loved Jael and though she was married to someone else, she loved him back, so he came to be hidden by her. But when it became clear that he has been tracked to her tent, he asks her to kill him so she is not put in danger.

All these theories imagine more than what appears on the pages of the Bible. They consider other passages in the Torah and what is known about local tribal matters, cultic religions, ancient legends, and the translations of individual words."

I believe that Jael was inspired by God to take Sisera's life, no matter what the theories are. What do you think after reading Judges 4:11-24 and Judges 5:24-27?

God is not only wiser and stronger and more steadfast than any human family member can be, but God doesn't have to come back because God never leaves at all! With gratitude, we can consider the trustworthy nature of our God.
